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The SPF Legacy

In April 2022, Ceredigion and Powys County Councils were allocated £42.4 million for local investment through the UK Shared Prosperity Fund. This fund aimed to level up communities through investment in Communities and Place, Supporting Local Businesses, People and Skills, and Multiply.

Key Successes: Evaluated by Wavehill



We are thrilled to share the independently evaluated successes of our recent initiatives, showcasing the positive impact across business growth, community engagement, skills development, and collaboration. The efforts highlighted below are a testament to the hard work and commitment of everyone involved.

Business Growth and Support

Our business grant schemes have had a remarkable effect, supporting 217 new and existing businesses. These efforts resulted in **503** Full-Time Equivalent (FTE) job impacts and contributed to an impressive **£5.8** million increase in turnover, with a net additional GVA impact of **£1.9** million. More than three-quarters of businesses reported increased growth

aspirations, with many even hiring staff for the first time, marking a significant milestone in their development.

Community Engagement and Infrastructure

We exceeded our targets for local events and activities, greatly enhancing community engagement and fostering a sense of unity. Additionally, our focus on environmental improvements led to substantial achievements, such as the creation of new and improved cycleways, footpaths, and a notable increase in tree planting, further enhancing the local environment.

Skills Development

The programme has made a profound impact on skills development, especially in areas like life skills and support for individuals who are furthest from the labour market. This has helped many individuals secure employment and improve their prospects. Additionally, there was a strong emphasis on building green and digital skills, aligning with broader regional development priorities and ensuring that participants are well-equipped for future opportunities.

Collaborative Approach

Collaboration has been at the heart of our success. Strong partnerships between Ceredigion and Powys councils have led to effective governance and seamless management systems. Our umbrella projects have been particularly successful in making support more accessible to small community groups and businesses, ensuring that no one is left behind.

Flexibility and Adaptability

One of the key strengths of the programme has been its broad and flexible design, which has allowed us to respond quickly to emerging needs and changing demands. This flexibility, combined with local autonomy, has empowered stakeholders to take ownership of their priorities, fostering meaningful local decision-making and ensuring the initiatives truly reflect community needs.

These successes demonstrate the power of collaboration, adaptability, and targeted support in driving positive change. We look forward to continuing this momentum and building on these achievements in the future!

From a small farm workshop in Bronant to an international brand, ani-bendod has embroidered Welsh culture onto thousands of t-shirts, gifts, and hearts. With support from ARFOR and Cynnal y Cardi via the Shared Prosperity Fund, Anwen James has built a thriving rural business that blends creativity, sustainability, and community.

From local roots to national recognition – how SPF funding helped launch a Powys business onto Dragons' Den

One ambitious Powys-based business has risen through the ranks thanks to targeted support from Powys County Council and the UK Shared Prosperity Fund (SPF). The funding played a crucial role in helping the enterprise scale up, strengthen its business plan, and prepare for wider growth — proving how local investment can unlock national opportunities.

This backing helped the business reach an impressive milestone: attracting the attention of investors on BBC's Dragons' Den, where it pitched for national support. The achievement is a

testament to the power of local and SPF support in nurturing homegrown talent and giving businesses the tools to step confidently onto bigger stages.

SPF funding has played a key role in supporting the growth of Cigydd Sion Jones Butcher, a local business rooted in quality, sustainability, and community. Led by experienced butcher Sion Jones, the funding has enabled the business to expand its offer of locally sourced produce, strengthen ties with nearby farmers, and invest in community engagement — including educational visits to schools to promote sustainable food choices.

Sion's dedication was recognised at a recent awards ceremony, where he received the Caru Ceredigion Award and was named the overall winner across all categories. His success story highlights how the UK Shared Prosperity Fund can empower small businesses to thrive while making a lasting impact on their communities.

From 'egg chasing' to egg production

Among the recipients of business growth grants from Powys County Council last year - which totalled just under £1 million - was Welsh rugby international Dan Lydiate.

Dan, who is currently plying his trade with the Newport-based Dragons and has 75 caps for Wales and the British and Irish Lions, has set up his own egg production company on his family's farm in Abbeycwmhir.

No6 Egg Company, named after the shirt number he usually wears on the rugby field as a blindside flanker, received just over £4,000 from the county council towards new farm management software in 2024.

Welshhomestead Smokery is an award-winning smokehouse on a small holding at Maesyffynnon, Penuwch and has grown considerably since its launch in 2019. They recently opened their new workshop and kitchen which has been supported by the UK Shared Prosperity Fund (UKSPF) through the Cynnal y Cardi Fund which is administrated and supported by Ceredigion County Council.

71 companies helped to grow with grants worth just under £1m

Seventy-one Powys companies were helped to expand, or secure their future, last year with growth grants from the county council totalling £994,000.

The money was put towards projects costing more than £10 million in total, with the businesses themselves investing £9.4 million.


The 71 companies are involved in everything from designer furniture to factory robotics and received between £940 and £25,000 each after the council secured £1.2 million for the scheme, from the UK Government's Shared Prosperity Fund.

SPF may be winding down, but our region continues to buzz with events and opportunities that have benefitted from SPF funding. Here's what's coming up this spring and summer:


Caru'ch Cymuned / Love your Community NEW Category for Caru Ceredigion Awards 2025

Applications will shortly be open for a new category in the 2025 Caru Ceredigion Awards. The **Caru'ch Cymuned** award will recognise and celebrate the work of town and village communities across Ceredigion in keeping their community tidy, arranging events and providing services to the people of the area.

Communities large and small are being encouraged to enter. The **Caru'ch Cymuned** campaign is aimed at fostering and celebrating a sense of pride in communities across the county, while encouraging people to take part in activities and initiatives that enhance the environment, support local businesses, and strengthen community cohesion and resilience.

There are three categories in the competition for 2025/ 2026 Awards; Small villages, Villages and Towns. The Caru Ceredigion Awards are funded through the UK Shared Prosperity Fund and are administrated by the Cynnal y Cardi team at Ceredigion County Council. *The fund is targeted at specific business sectors. Eligible applicants must be private businesses that are formally constituted as a Company (Limited Company or Limited by Guarantee) or a Partnership (with a Partnership Agreement), and operate in specific sectors including Construction, Electrical and Plumbing, Information and Communications, Manufacturing, Professional Services, Real Estate, and Wholesale, Retail and Motor Trade. The fund is not open to speculative property developers, public bodies, or charities.

Innovating to Optimise Rural Grids Through Agricultural Communities

Continuing with sharing the five successful applicants who received funding to carry out feasibility studies in decarbonising agriculture, watch these clips from **Centre for Energy Equality** - **HARVEST**, **Severn Wye Energy Agency** and **Challoch Energy**.

Centre for Energy Equality - *HARVEST* (Holistic Agricultural and Rural Virtual Energy System Transition): Using a decentralised, community-owned model, a virtual power plant that would link household, business, and farm-based renewable energy systems—such as solar panels and batteries. Based in Llanidloes.

Severn Wye Energy Agency - Helping business lower the load: Focusing on implementing Smart Local Energy Systems (SLES) in industrial and business parks, this project aims to reduce energy demand on the grid through local renewable energy generation and battery storage. Based at Four crosses near Welshpool.

Challoch Energy - Village rural energy in Mid Wales: Evaluating the potential for developing a community based, local integrated energy system which will both decarbonise the community and bring financial benefits through more affordable energy. Locations across both counties are being scoped to identify which communities are suitable, aiming for an even split across both Local Authorities.

We're moving forward on digital connectivity in Mid Wales!

Three exciting projects were approved, at a recent Growing Mid Wales Board, to move forward to boost our region's digital future:

- ◆ Mobile Coverage & Capacity Project tackling mobile coverage gaps across rural Mid Wales to ensure more reliable provision.
- Business Park FTTP Project bringing gigabit full-fibre broadband directly to key business parks to drive productivity and innovation.
- ◆ LoRaWAN Stimulation Project rolling out low-power, long-range network technology to support smart sensors in farming, manufacturing and more.

These projects are part of our Growth Deal Digital Programme – delivering infrastructure that connects communities and supports economic growth. They have received outline

approval – which means that further detailed development work will be underway over the summer, with delivery anticipated from this autumn.
